Climb with Charlie



Charlie Bird had a long career in Irish Journalism. He joined RTE in 1974 and was at the heart of many big news events over thirty years, breaking major stories and interviewing presidents and prime ministers. He covered national and international news throughout his working life.



This book by Charlie tells the stories of over 50 people who were deeply affected by the marriage equality vote in 2015. These are real stories of LGBT people who have lived in the shadow of inequality for decades. It is a moving account of a moment which transformed our society and history.

Mooncoin native, Vicky Phelan is widely known in the public domain as an inspirational and motivational campaigner. Her memoir "Overcoming" is a remarkable personal story, of a lady who has continued to live life to the full as best



she can under sometimes harrowing circumstances.
