
Library Layout



Libraries come in all shapes and sizes, but most contain a list of common factors... Information Desk. Self-Service Kiosk, Printing Facilities, Displays, Fiction, Non-Fiction, Teens, Children's, Public Computers, Reference, Audio Visual CDs, DVDs, Audiobooks, Bathroom

The Dewey Decimal Classification System

Non-fiction books in the library, shelved using the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) system. It is the most widely used library classification system in the world. The word "Dewey" refers to Melvil Dewey (1851-1931) who devised the classification in 1876. The second word "Decimal" re-



fers to the base-ten notation that is used to denote and relate subjects. It is continuously revised to keep pace with knowledge. The books are shelved numerically by classification number. The classification number (also called the class number or shelf number) appears on a label on the spine of the book. The Dewey System ranges from 001-999. Almost any subject you can think of has a corresponding Dewey number from dinosaurs (567.91) to dessert recipes (641.86).

The Long and Short of it!



Staff members at Northwestern University Library Cataloging Department, identified what is believed to be the longest Dewey number ever-a 23-digit monster for 'Arab Attitudes Toward Israel' by Yehoshafat Harkabi,



Dictionaries-The Ultimate Book of Lists

All good libraries stock a selection of dictionaries. "A book that *lists* the words

of a language (in alphabetical order) and gives their meaning, or gives the equivalent words in a different language, often also providing information about pronunciation, origin, and usage'

Alphabetical Order

Novels (fiction books) are shelved in alphabetical order, using the author's last name, followed by the first name. Be careful with double names, author initials, Mc, Mac and O'. Please use this guide, to help you.
